



Nursing Barriers With Implementation of a Triage-based Public Health Screening Program in an Urban ED

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Research support

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Background

- Universal HIV screening & Targeted HCV screening
- Triage based: screening performed by triage nurses
- Nursing participation critical to effective implementation



Objective

 To determine nursing satisfaction with the Public Health Screening program and identify potential barriers to implementation



The Survey

- Sent to <u>all</u> RN's in ED via email
- Survey Monkey, Inc.
- 55 questions
- Likert scale for satisfaction
- Designed by MD's/research team
- Domains: Perceptions, Attitudes, Satisfaction, Barriers

The Results

- 42% response rate (65/153)
- 75% of respondents worked triage



Satisfaction

- 96% felt that the PHS "benefited the entire community"
- 80% agreed that PHS "improved overall ED care"
- 57% were satisfied with the program



Nursing experience

- "Uncomfortable asking" at triage
 - HIV: 39%
 - HCV: 34%
 - IVDU: 45%



Nursing experience

- 72% felt that PHS "interfered with triage efficiency"
- 41%: PHS "adversely affected flow"



Barriers to offering testing

BARRIER	HIV	HCV
Language Barriers	25%	24%
Lack of Privacy	22%	12%
Ineligibility	20%	29%
Too Busy	16%	19%

Conclusion

- Strong support for PHS
- Execution met with substantial staff barriers/dissatisfaction
- Goal: Improve satisfaction to improve implementation
