Cape Coast Teaching Hospital Ghana Experience

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Cape Coast Teaching Hospital (CCTH)

- 400-bed capacity tertiary referral centre on southern coast of Ghana
- Hospital established in 1998 as a regional hospital and upgraded to teaching hospital in 2014
- General internal medicine and sub-specialties, General Surgery and sub-specialties, Obstetrics and Gynaecology, Paediatrics
- Training center for medical students, nurses and other allied health professionals





Hepatitis B Clinic

- CCTH Viral Hepatitis Clinic established in 2009 by a medical officer with interest in HIV
- Current clinic team
 - General Internal Medicine Specialist
 - Medical officer
 - Clinic nurse
 - Other: pharmacist, laboratorian
- Once a week clinic with 12-15 patients booked per each clinic day





Hepatitis B Clinic

- Patients may be referred to Hep B clinic from
 - Clinician-initiated screening
 - Blood donation services
 - Antenatal clinic
 - Other clinics in the hospital e.g. presurgical, HIV
 - Self-referral after Opportunistic screening
 - Annual world hepatitis day screening in hospital and surrounding communities







Decentralising and expanding HBV services

- HBV services in Polyclinics Initiative initiated by the Ghana Association for the Study of Liver and Digestive Diseases (GASLIDD)
 - In partnership with WHO Ghana country office and National Viral Hepatitis Control Programme
- Training of HCW from three polyclinics to run weekly or monthly hepatitis clinic
 - Medical officers, nurses, health information, lab
- Teams contact/consult with assigned gastroenterologist for discussion of difficult/complex cases or for referral to larger centers
- Clinics began in February / March 2023



Hepatitis B-related Research in CCTH

- Evaluating Healthcare worker knowledge on PMTCT and implementation of HBV PMTCT training for HCWs in Ghana
- Clinical characteristics and antiviral treatment eligibility of newly diagnosed hepatitis B patients
- Challenges associated with treatment initiation for newly diagnosed patients with hepatitis B
- Assessing vaccination response among HCWs
- Determining prevalence of occult HBV infection
- Hepatitis Evaluations to Amplify Testing and Treatment (HEAT)

Further research

- Optimal models for decentralisation of Hepatitis B services in Ghana
- Potential barriers and facilitators to treatment access and decentralised care
- Impact and implications of new expanded treatment guidelines for the health service and for patients
- Tools to follow-up and monitor patients at different levels of the healthcare system
