

Key Themes

- Payers are supportive
 - Public
 - CMS encourages best 'models' for delivery and conversations with state partners
 - Private
 - Be aware of contracts between hospitals and insurers
 - Hospitals
 - Medically necessary 'we'll figure it out'
 - Downstream revenue (costs savings)

USPHTF may simplify reimbursement

Key Themes

- Coverage does not necessarily equate with line items payments for service
 - Bundling impacts reimbursement
 - Federal and state views don't necessarily translate into operations of payment organization (MCOs)
- Coverage also doesn't equate with usage
 - Need for education/outreach
- Unintended consequences of billing
 - Cost for self-payers /costs hospital for denied charges
 - Potential impact on testing

Themes

- Role of EDs in prevention
 - Both public and private payers expressed concerns regarding prevention measures (testing) in EDs
 - ? Costly
 - Expanded and primary care integrated models
 - Conversely, missed opportunities in EDs persist and costs may be overinflated

 Graded pace of drawing down CDC funds important

Solutions

- Mandates versus incentives
- Approaches to roll-out
 - Negotiated advocacy
 - Business plan/special mechanisms required
 - Cycle of claims submission/reimbursement

versus

- 'Just do it'
 - Use same system as any other test
 - Establish mechanisms for using health department as payer of last resort
- Optimize models that attend to cost and efficiency

Unmet Needs

Further local experimentation experience required

- Technical assistance
 - Knowledge gaps
