

Hepatitis B is Vaccine-Preventable!

By **2030**, total liver cancer incidence is expected to increase by **145%**, with the highest percentage of new cases among **Asians and Hispanics**.

Address health disparities affecting AAPIs, identify their cause and develop strategies to reduce them.


Develop best practice models to improve community health which can be replicated and scaled.



HEPP OBJECTIVES

- Build the *infrastructure* and *capacity* of Asian communities for hepatitis education and prevention.
- Provide targeted *outreach* and *health education* through community health workers (CHWs).
- Increase hepatitis *screening* rates for at-risk Asian populations.
- Provide appropriate *linkage to care* for Asians for either the hepatitis vaccine or medical follow-up for chronic infections.
