## Newly Diagnosed Positives Identified by HIV Testing Programs in New York City



#### Background

In 2006, the New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (NYC DOHMH) began expanding HIV testing in NYC.






### Methods

- NYC DOHMH matched preliminary positive cases identified by funded contracts from 2006-2010 against the NYC HIV/AIDS (HARS) registry and categorized them as newly or previously diagnosed.
- Presence of a CD4 or VL report served as a proxy for medical care linkage.



#### Significant Increases in Both HIV Testing Volume and New HIV Diagnoses Among Funded Programs in NYC






# New HIV Diagnoses




#### Gender and Race/Ethnicity – All Tested vs. New Diagnoses







# More newly diagnosed clients were identified as concurrent diagnoses fell





#### Limitations

• The data reported here are not reflective of all HIV testing performed in New York City.

• Linkage to care uses CD4 and Viral Load lab testing as a proxy for provision of primary medical care.



#### Conclusions

- From 2006 to 2010, NYC DOHMH dramatically increased the number of HIV tests performed in NYC, the number of new diagnoses, and the number of persons linked to care.
- Concurrent diagnoses have fallen since 2006.
- Most new cases were linked to medical care in under 90 days.
- The large proportion of patients linked to care demonstrates that active case finding for HIV may increase the number of patients receiving treatment.
